Earl A. Wieland, 63-year-old Home Office Accounting annuitant, died Aug. 18 in Cleveland's Lakeside Hospital. He had been hospitalized about a week for leukemia.

Mr. Wieland began an early retirement April 1 this year after more than 45 years' active service. His first retirement venture in the spring was a 31-day ocean cruise to South America with his wife Anna, who survives him.

A native Clevelander, Earl started with Sohio as an office boy in Cleveland Sales Division in 1913. After a tour of World War I army duty, he returned to Sohio in 1919. He had been in Home Office since 1933, for the past eight years as a report clerk in Accounts Receivable.

Besides his wife, Earl is survived by his mother, Mrs. Emma



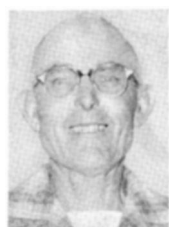

Charles Heckerman

Since his retirement from Products Pipe Line, Charles Heckerman had lived in St. Petersburg, Fla., with his wife, the former Hattie Mae Hardin, whom he wed there in 1957.

Mr. Heckerman, 68, better known as "Red" or "Charley" to many Sohioans, died July 30 following a heart attack at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Helen Lybarger, in Millbury, Ohio. The Heckermans were attending a family reunion there.

Born and educated in Weston, Ohio, Charley joined Sohio in April 1942 as a tank truck driver in Products Pipe Line's northeastern Ohio territory, where he collected crude from many small leases. He held this job until he became an annuitant in 1956.

In addition to his wife and daughter, Charley is survived by three sons — Ivan, Donald, and Ronald; three stepchildren; five grandchildren; and five step-grandchildren.

Mary E. Frey

Mary E. Frey, 54-year-old Youngstown Sales Division Sohioan, died Aug. 3 of cancer at her home, 56 Halls Heights Ave., Youngstown, Ohio. She had been on sick leave since October of last year.

Mrs. Frey, a lifelong resident of Youngstown, was a member of St. Brendan Church and the Altar and Rosary Society. She is survived by her husband Allen, to whom she was married 28 years ago; two brothers, George and Joseph Assion; and two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Scott and Mrs. Helen Hickey.

Originally employed as a stenographer at Youngstown Division in 1931, Mary left Sohio in 1950 to move to Florida. Her continuous service dated from 1952 when she returned to Youngstown as personnel clerk and secretary to the division manager. That is the post that she held when she became ill.

Hollie J. Glenn

Hollie J. Glenn, gauger and pipeliner in Transportation's Prairie Area, died July 21 while working in Coon Creek District near Arcadia, Okla. His death at age 60 was due to a heart attack.

Mr. Glenn, who lived nearby in Luther, Okla., had been a Sohioan since August 1944. Hired as a laborer in Transportation's Tri-State Division, the following year he transferred to Southwestern Division as an operator at WEHLU's Banks Pumping Station.

Later assignments as gauger, pipeliner, and station engineer took him into Texas, Kansas, and Arkansas. Since 1957 he had been in the post he held at the time of his death.

A native of Greenup, Ill., Hollie had long been an active Mason. He is survived by his wife Christine.

common stock, 48,682 shares of preferred stock, and 169,957 United States \$25 savings bonds.

Since the plan began, an average of 64 cents of each dollar added to SEIP accounts has been allotted by participants, the investment plan committee reports. The remaining 36 cents of each dollar came from company contributions, dividends, and sales of securities.

A copy of the investment plan committee's report was mailed to all SEIP members earlier this month.
